What does a Phlebotomist do?

Phlebotomists draw blood for tests, transfusions, research, and blood donations.

Duties:

- Draw blood from patients and blood donors
- Talk with patients and donors to help them feel less nervous about having their blood drawn
- Verify a patient's or donor's identity to ensure proper labeling of the blood
- Label the drawn blood for testing or processing
- Enter patient information into a database
- Assemble and maintain medical instruments such as needles, test tubes, and blood vials
- Keep work areas clean and sanitary

What is their work environment like?

Phlebotomists work in hospitals, medical and diagnostic laboratories, blood donor centers, and doctors' offices.

How do you become a Phlebotomists?

Phlebotomists typically enter the occupation with a certification from a Phlebotomy program. Almost all employers look for Phlebotomists who have earned this professional certification.
