What does a CPCT/A do? In addition to performing skills associated with being a Phlebotomy Technician or an EKG Technician, you may perform skills such as: basic patient care, acquiring, distributing and administering patient care supplies, performing safety checks and provide emotional support to patients and families.

#### **Duties:**

- Serve as a Phlebotomist
- Conduct EKGs (Electrocardiograms)
- Checking patients' blood pressure, heartbeat and pulse regularly
- Providing compassionate care by listening to patients' concerns
- Monitoring patients' condition and providing updates to healthcare team
- Turning, repositioning and move patients between beds, wheelchairs and seats
- Helping patients use bathroom and dress
- Monitoring patients' food and liquid intake
- Escort patients to get X-rays and other imaging tests

#### What is their work environment like?

Most CPCT/As work in nursing and residential care facilities and in hospitals. They are physically active and may need to help lift or move patients.

### How do you become a CPCT/A?

CPCT/As typically enter the occupation with a certification from The National Healthcareer Association (NHA). Almost all employers look for CPCT/As who have earned this professional certification.

What is the Career Outlook for a CPCT/A? Overall employment of CPCT/As is projected to grow 17 percent from 2020 to 2030, much faster than average for all occupations.
